


The Proudest Blue: A Story of Hijab and Family Witten by Ibtihaj Muhammad



UN Convention on the Right of the Child

Article of the Week

We are very proud to be a Unicef Rights Respecting School, having achieved the **Unicef UK Silver - Rights Aware Award.**

To help children carry on the discussion at home, we will be focussing different articles of the convention in each newsletter so that our families can explore the rights and meanings together.

As we shared with you last week, this term, Mrs Wright assemblies will focus on the Gordonbrock vision.

Self-expression is one of the key values embedded in our curriculum.

This freedom of expression can be linked to Article 13 of UN Convention: Sharing Thoughts Freely.

The child shall have the right to freedom of expression; this right shall include freedom to seek, receive and impart information and ideas of all kinds, regardless of frontiers, either orally, in writing or in print, in the form of art, or through any other media of the child's choice.

TALKING TEENS







Family Thrive Early Help Co-ordinators are running a free course for parents or carers of teenagers and pre-teens who are looking to better understand and communicate with them – It offers an opportunity to understand what's going on in the adolescent brain and how to understand their feelings and behaviors using an authoritative parenting style. Sessions will focus on relationships within the family, communication, negotiation, decision-making and strategies to reduce conflict.

The group aims to develop: relationships between teenagers and parents/carers, a calmer home life, confidence when talking about difficult issues an understanding of teenage needs and development.

This would be eligible for: Parents and carers of pre-teens and teenagers who are currently in years 6 & 7 but there may be availability for years 5 & 8 that don't have physical or extremely challenging behaviour present in or outside of the family home and reside and attend at school in Lewisham.

How long is the course?

Each group is 4 sessions over the course of 4 weeks 2 hours per session (10.00am-12.00pm)

NHS Tavistock & Portman are looking for children aged between 4 and 9 with behaviour problems to take part in their **personalised programmes** for children study.

The study is based at the Tavistock & Portman and at King's College London, and they are running a trial of new interventions for parents of children with behaviour problems.

These interventions are designed specifically for parents who have been **offered group parent training**, but not found it helpful for their child's problems.

You might either have tried a group and dropped out, or simply felt that a group was not the right place to address your child's particular problems.

Parents have said that what they really need is a more **personal** approach, **one-to-one** with an expert on children's problems over a number of weeks, and that is what we are offering.

Who can take part?

To be eligible to take part in their trial, you must have a child **aged 4 to 9** whose behaviour is causing problems.



Our interventions are not designed for children who have autism (or suspected autism) or a significant learning disability.
