

FASHION DESIGNER VISITS YEAR FOUR

In April, Year 4 had a visit from designer Ryan Hawaii. He is an artist and fashion designer from the local area who spoke to us about his practice and his influences. He makes a lot of clothes using repurposed materials which is a key part of our design process. After a year-group assembly, Ryan led a workshop for each class where the children created their own patches by cutting out their design from felt and stitching them to a background fabric. These patches are going to be sewn onto the bags that the children are making for Design Technology.

Who are they looking for?

They invite applications from all enthusiastic young singers and performers aged 7 to 11 years old. They particularly welcome applications from boys, those who are from a global majority background and/or those who are disabled, as they are under-represented within their programmes. Applicants should be able to demonstrate:

- a passion for and commitment to singing and good vocal control
- an interest in drama and performing skills
- the ability to collaborate well with others and follow direction



Inspired by the National Gallery's Take One Picture exhibition, Gordonbrock and Eliot Bank Schools Federation launch **Take One Building** as part of the whole-school Art curriculum for the summer term. This follows in the footsteps of previous Take Ones at Gordonbrock—including Take One Artist (Yayoi Kusama) and Take One Book (The Dreamer, by Mark Janssen).

Introducing architecture as an art form, the project provides a platform to explore iconic London buildings through art to deepen cultural and historical understanding and to encourage creative reinterpretation of familiar structures to spark dialogue and reflection.

We also invite parents and the wider community to take part, fostering community engagement through collaborative art-making activities and look forward to showcasing outcomes in an exhibition at the end of term.



EYFS—The Shard

This iconic skyscraper is the focus for Nursery and Reception. They will explore the work of pioneering artist and printmaker **Anni Albers**, using weaving techniques and geometric patterns.



Year 1—The Horniman

Renowned for its eclectic collection of anthropology, natural history and musical instruments. The Horniman Museum is the Year 1 focus. Artwork to be inspired by the colourful landscape works of David Hockney.



Year 2—Dawson's Heights

Designed by Kate
Macintosh, Dawson's
Heights is celebrated for
its bold Brutalist
architecture and
innovative use of space.
David Umemoto's
sculpture work is the
inspiration for Year 2.



Year 3—London Aquatics Centre

Renowned architect, Zaha
Hadid, designed the
London Aquatics Centre:
an architectural marvel
famous for its wave-like
roof. Frank Bowling's weton-wet technique pairs
brilliantly as the art focus
for Year 3.



Year 4—Nubia Way

Built in the 1990s by
Fusions Jameen, London's
first Black housing cooperative, Nubia Way's
sustainable self-building
project is a focus for Year
4. Modular sculpture pairs
with this architectural
approach.



Year 5—Lloyds of London

Known as the 'inside-out' building, Lloyds of London is an iconic architectural marvel with futuristic design and innovative features. Year 5 focus on Evan Hecox, whose artwork is inspired by urban landscapes and city life.



Year 6—The Barbican

The sprawling residential and arts complex. The Barbican, is the focus for Year 6. Hurvin Anderson's work, characterized by loose brushwork, fragmented compositions and a vibrant palette, provides art inspiration.

The Tate Modern is a renowned contemporary art gallery housed in the former Bankside Power Station in London, designed by architect Sir Giles Gilbert Scott. It opened to the public in 2000 after a major redesign by Swiss architects Herzog & de Meuron, featuring a striking industrial aesthetics. The building's iconic Turbine Hall serves as a vast exhibition space for large-scale installations and has become a cultural landmark on the city's South Bank.

For inspiration, why not take a trip to the Tate Modern over the half-term break? Most of the exhibition spaces are free to enter.
