
YEAR SIX END-OF-YEAR PERFORMANCE, 'MATILDA'

CONTEMPORARY DANCE AT TRINITY LABAN

A group of Y6 pupils at Gordonbrock are members of Trinity Laban's Youth Contemporary, a programme aimed at introducing participants to contemporary dance techniques, whilst also developing their choreographic skills, movement vocabulary and expression. They were keen to share their experience with you in the hope that your child might express an interest in joining Trinity Laban, too!

Trinity Laban is a fun, nurturing and safe environment. When you join this dance family, you can expect kind, understanding and creative staff to welcome you to this magical haven of song and dance.

Trinity Laban does an annual performance where students can showcase their choreography to parents and family members. There is a summer and spring show, and your child's class will be selected to perform in one each year.



When you aren't rehearsing for your show, you are making lifelong friendships and exploring new techniques. It is mainly contemporary but there are other courses you can pursue which demonstrate different styles, such as CAT (Centre for Advanced Training), a course for aged 12 and over. If you get in, you will learn hip-hop, contemporary and ballet. There's also TLYDC (Trinity Laban's Youth Dance Company) and many more.

In conclusion, Trinity Laban is a home, a community and a family. From the little kids who can't stop fidgeting to young adults looking for a career in dance, Trinity Laban accepts all. More information about Trinity Laban and their various courses is available on their website.


IN THE SPOTLIGHT

PROGRESSION IN DRAWING FOR A YOUNG ARTIST AT GORDONBROCK

In EYFS, young artists learn to safely use a variety of materials, tools and techniques, experimenting with colour, design, texture, form and function. They begin to include more detail in drawings, such as fingers on hands and facial features. There is improved representation of people and objects which are more proportional and recognisable. They share their creations, explaining the process they have used.

YEAR ONE

In **Year 1**, our young artists use different pencils and crayons. They use different lines (in terms of shape and thickness) and explore grades of pencil.

In **Year 2**, our budding artists use different pencil grades (2B, B and H). They use charcoal, pencil and pastels to create different tones usin light and dark, and show pattern and texture in their drawing.


YEAR THREE

In Year 4, our young artists use marks and lines to show tone and texture. They organise line, tone, shape and colour to represent figures and forms in motion. They can explain why they have chosen specific materials to

draw with. They show facial expression and body

language in their sketches.

In Year 3, our young artists use different grades of pencil to show tone and texture. They use sketches to help produce a final piece and write explanations next to sketches. They show facial expression in their drawings.

In **Year 5**, as well as refining the technical skills learnt in Year 4, our young artists are able to express their emotions accurately through their sketches. They keep notes about how they might develop their work further.

YEAR SIX

In Year 6, our young artists communicate emotions and a sense of self with accuracy and imagination in their sketches. They are able to explain why they have combined different tools to create drawing and explain why they have chosen specific techniques. They can explain what their own style is. In their sketchbooks, they record detailed notes and quotes, explaining items.
