FRANK BOWLING PROJECT

In conjunction with our Federation-partner school, Eliot Bank, we are delighted to announce an exciting art project in collaboration with Frank Bowling Studios.

A group of year 5 pupils from both Eliot Bank and Gordonbrock join forces to create Frank Bowling-inspired artwork under the guidance of the studios.

Their creative efforts will culminate in work for display at the prestigious Lloyd's of London building.



Sir Frank Bowling is a renowned British-Guyanese artist celebrated for his groundbreaking contributions to abstract art. With a career spanning over six decades, Bowling is best known for his vibrant and dynamic use of colour, texture and innovative techniques that push the boundaries of traditional painting. His work often blends personal narratives with broader themes of history, migration and identity, creating visually striking and thought-provoking pieces. A Royal Academician since 2005, Bowling has received numerous accolades, including a knighthood in 2020 for his services to art. His work continues to inspire and influence artists worldwide

JAZZ ON TOUR

The future of London jazz comes to the Gordonbrock Concert Hall.

On Thursday, 23 January, we were thrilled to welcome world renowned UK saxophonist **Tony Kofi**. A virtuoso performer and multi-award-winning artist, Tony Kofi is celebrated for his soulful sound and mastery of jazz. During his visit, he led **The Trinity Laban Thelonious Monk Band** - formed of Trinity Laban students - in a fantastic celebration of jazz music.

Based in Greenwich, **Trinity Laban's world-class jazz** programme has launched the careers of many of the top names on the current UK jazz scene including Moses Boyd, Nubya Garcia, Deschanel Gordon, and Laura Jurd.

The band focuses on performing the works of legendary jazz pianist and composer Thelonious Monk (1917–1982). While guided by renowned Monk experts—saxophonist and Trinity Laban tutor Tony Kofi, along with Head of Jazz Hans Koller—this ensemble is fundamentally student-led. Trinity Laban's senior jazz students bring their own experiences with Monk's music through personal practice and listening, using this platform to delve deeper into his repertoire within a collaborative setting.

The result is accessible music with a joyful, soulful and big band sound – even featuring euphonium, double bass and baritone sax in the line-up. With spontaneity and excitement added by on the spot improvisations in the unique harmonic-rhythmic milieu of Monk. As Monk said himself: "When you are swinging, swing some more!"

We were incredibly fortunate to have **two music** assemblies: one for our younger pupils and one for older pupils, with Q&A sessions and an opportunity to play some of their instruments at the end of the session. Throughout the assemblies Tony explained the meaning and story behind each piece, the dynamics and tempo markings and featured solo instruments.

BEHIND THE NOTES

Looking behind the scenes of orchestra's music-making.

Welcome to our new feature "Behind The Notes" where we look behind the scenes at our music making at Gordonbrock! From singing assemblies before our BIG SING's, whole class instrumental learning, EYFS mini musical making and more!

In this edition, we feature our KS2 Orchestra as they look at their most challenging piece to date: *Pirates Of The Caribbean* by Hans Zimmer.

From it's inception just over a year ago our orchestra now has over 35 young musicians, with: one student conductor, three piano players, four drummers, four violinists, five flutes, two clarinets, four trumpets, eight recorders and seven guitarists!

From this incredible uptake in interest on the back of our Music For Youth at Royal Albert Hall performance we have doubled our rehearsal times: Monday and Friday lunchtimes 12:30-1pm with LKS2 having an early lunch and UKS2 having a later lunch.

Working at times during the piece in five-part harmony in rhythmic unison, we have been developing our dynamics, increasing tempos and improving our ensemble skills by following our conductor very closely. Following the music on the stave is a big part of our ensemble playing, counting bars rests and being prepared to come in at the right place is crucial for a successful performance!

Our young musicians have just started our next piece: *The Addams Family Theme Tune* with *Black Magic* by Little Mix coming up later in the new half term.


STAY STILL...

PROGRESSION IN SCULPTURE

This term's art focus is sculpture. Throughout their artistic journey, pupils move from playful exploration to sophisticated craftsmanship, developing not only technical skills but also a strong sense of creativity and expression in their sculptural work.

In **EYFS**, the focus is on experimentation with materials, tools and techniques. Our young artists begin to explore colour, design, texture and form, gaining confidence in handling different materials. They are encouraged to share and explain their creations, laying the foundation for reflection on artistic choices.

By **Year 1**, artists start working with basic sculpting techniques, such as cutting, rolling, squeezing, pinching and coiling materials. They learn to join simple objects together and experiment with adding texture using tools, allowing them to create both familiar and imaginative forms.



In **Year 2**, their ability to manipulate materials improves, enabling them to work on a larger scale and with greater control. They begin to construct more complex forms, such as clay pumpkins, and develop an understanding of joining techniques.





By Year 3, independence becomes a key theme. Artists are encouraged to select materials and tools with minimal support, taking part in longer projects that develop over multiple stages. They begin working with life-size materials and explore creating collaborative large-scale sculpture, demonstrating a greater awareness of form and structure.





In **Year 6**, artists bring all their skills together to create sculptures that demonstrate a deep understanding of form, proportion and composition through found-object assemblage. They can choose and apply the most appropriate techniques to transform everyday materials into expressive, thought-provoking works. By repurposing and reimagining discarded objects, they reflect their observations of the natural or real world in innovative ways. Their ability to work on a range of scales allows them to communicate ideas effectively, producing well-balanced and carefully constructed sculptures that give new life and meaning to the materials they use.
