



#### **Exploring Perimeter, Gymnastics and Fairy Tales: Year 3's Action-Packed Week**



Upon completion, we calculated the perimeter of each robot. This was quite the challenge! During indoor PE, we began our gymnastics unit focusing on creating basic shapes with our bodies. We also enjoyed watching a clip of Olympic medalist and the most decorated gymnast in history, Simone Biles, completing one of her incredible floor routines which we then discussed, noting the different movements and elements of choreography.

In English, we have been discussing the features of fairy tales, sharing our favourites and exploring a new class text 'The Little Wooden Robot and the Log Princess'. We then chose an adventure from the story as the basis of our own fairytale, which we planned using a story mountain. We can't wait for next week where we will plan and write our own fairytales from scratch!


























# Mrs Wright's Recommended Reads

## Article of the Week

We are very proud to be a Unicef Rights Respecting School, having achieved the Unicef UK Silver - Rights Aware Award.

To help children carry on the discussion at home, we will be focussing different articles of the convention in each newsletter so that our families can explore the rights and meanings together.



All children have all these rights, no matter who they are, where they live, what language they speak, what their religion is, what they think, what they look like, if they are a boy or girl, if they have a disability, if they are rich or poor, and no matter who their parents or families are or what their parents or families believe or do. No child should be treated unfairly for any reason.

International Women's Day is celebrated on 8<sup>th</sup> March each year. It is an important day for many reasons, such as giving us the opportunity to celebrate how amazing women are, recognise how women have impacted and changed the world and to let women in our lives know how much they are appreciated.

Article 2 of the CRC reminds us that everyone should be treated equally regardless of gender. Unfortunately, many women in the world still face challenges and are frequently treated differently to men. For example, fewer girls around the world go to school than boys and women in many countries are still frequently paid less than men for doing the same job.

International Women's Day provides us with time to reflect on this and explore what we can do to make our school, city, country and world a place where gender equality exists.





The rights of a child, as outlined by UNICEF, are fundamental principles designed to ensure every child can grow, develop and thrive in a safe, healthy and supportive environment. These rights, enshrined in the United Nations Convention of the Rights of the Child (CRC), focus on protecting children from harm, promoting their well-being and empowering the to participate in decisions that affect their lives. Key rights include the right to education, healthcare, protection from exploitation and the right to express their opinions. UNICEF works globally to ensure that these rights are upheld for all children, regardless of their background or circumstance.
