Y6 Enjoy an Interactive Transport for London Safety Session

On Friday, 28 February 2025, our year group had a fantastic experience! TFL (Transport for London) came in to talk about Zip cards, travelling on our own, journey planning, getting help on transport and loads more!

We watched different scenarios about what happens sometimes on public transport. William (from TFL) told us what happens if you get on a train or bus without using your Zip / Oyster card – you get a £100 fine!

Someone from our class got to be the bus driver – he's mad about buses. We also learnt that the TFL symbol is called the roundel. It was so much fun and every Year 6 should get an experience like this. Best workshop ever!

Kaamilah - A4- "The advice that William gave was really useful. I did not know that a ZIP card allows you to have free travel on buses and trams. I liked the videos about how to be safe on the roads and how many different ways there are to travel in London."

Anna - A4- "I loved the TFL workshop because I learnt lots from the 3D interactive session and the presenter William, who was very funny. I learnt about how to deal with different situations when travelling and how important it is to be safe, sensible and polite."
Lily- Mae - A4- "I enjoyed hearing about how just a "Good morning" and a "Thank you" can brighten someone's day but also how one little mistake can lead to a problem when travelling. It is important to be safe when travelling of buses and trains."

Mickey - A4- "The TFL workshop was very helpful and fun. The 3D city on the screen was cool because you touch different parts of it and go to another separate picture. The presenter was very funny and he gave us good advice: be kind to the bus drivers, always stay your height plus one step away from the road and if you need help, ask someone with a TFL uniform."







Jenaya A6- "I learnt that the shape of the TFL logo is called a "roundel" and there are 13 different types of transport that TFL run. I enjoyed getting my free wallet for my ZIP cards and inside it, there were tips on being safe."

Lali A6-"William gave us some useful advice, such as: sometimes, walking can be quicker than getting a bus, why it is important to tap you Oyster card to avoid a £100 fine and why it is important not to go between train carriages when they are moving."

Article of the Week

We are very proud to be a Unicef Rights Respecting School, having achieved the **Unicef UK Silver - Rights Aware Award**.

To help children carry on the discussion at home, we will be focussing different articles of the convention in each newsletter so that our families can explore the rights and meanings together.



This week, we celebrated World Book Day! This links to three important articles from the CRC: 17, 29 and 31. Article 17 states that every child has the right to reliable information from a variety of sources, and governments should encourage the media to provide information that children can understand. Article 29 says that education must develop every child's personality, talents and abilities to the full. It must encourage the child's respect for human rights, as well as respect for their parents, their own and other cultures and the environment. Finally, Article 31 reminds us that every child has the right to relax, play and take part in a wide range of cultural and artistic activities.

Reading is such an important skill which can help us in so many ways including helping us learn new things about the world, allowing us to use our imaginations and finding out about how other people view the world. It can also make us feel so many things including excitement, fear, joy, sadness and calm.

At Gordonbrock, we prioritise reading across the curriculum, but other children around the world are not so lucky. This World Book Day, as you enjoy sharing stories with your family, maybe take a moment to consider how we can continue working towards a world where every child can learn how to read.



GB ATTENDANCE WEEKLY CHALLENGE FROM THE 3-7 MARCH 2025

Being in school every day that it is open is important to your child's achievement, wellbeing and their wider development.

Here's what the data shows:

- Pupils with higher attainment at KS2 and KS4 had lower levels of absence over the key stage compared to those with lower attainment.
- Generally, the higher the percentage of sessions missed across the key stage at KS2 and KS4, the lower the level of attainment at the end of the key stage.
- Among pupils with no missed sessions over KS2, 83.9% achieved the expected standard compared to 40.2% of pupils who were persistently absent.
